From the Pastor's Desk

No Pandemic (Covid-19) Can Overpower Us Matthew 14:22-33.

Covid-19, a pandemic of the twenty-first century, is not only deadly but has awakened the individual, the family, the community, the society – indeed, the whole world - to a new order. People throughout the world are anxious about the future but, at the same time, are addressing the present: working from home, dealing with joblessness and searching for tomorrow's food. They have empty pockets - without

even coins! There are uncertainties in their lives, some are having to educate their children at home, and more and more are being laid off jobs by their companies.

Will this continue to be normal? A million-dollar question without any certainty, without any answer.

Leaving apart all these, will there be a future for the Church? I say a big YES.

Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and precede him to the other side of the lake. He was not present with them. He sent them ahead. They did not think to ask him how he would get to the other side to meet them there. The disciples simply took for granted that they could reach the other side without Jesus, with just the help of the boat - a material thing.

The disciples did not even consider that crossing the sea would be a difficult way to travel to the other side. Yet, the boat would be troubled by the waves and winds and would make the travel difficult for them.

The disciples did not have strong faith. They had blind faith

in the material thing, the boat. They believed that they could reach the other side with the help of the boat. Did the boat help them? No.

What would have helped the disciples to feel secure and safe in the boat and to reach the other side? With closed eyes, without rational thinking, having little faith in Jesus, we know that Jesus would have helped them to feel secure and safe on the boat and reach the other side.

The disciples represent us. The boat symbolises material things, our own belief system, rational thinking and so on. The sea is the world.

Jesus meanwhile went up on the mountain by himself to pray. There was no one with Jesus at that moment. He sent off the disciples in the boat and he dismissed the crowds. He did not have anything or anybody with him as he climbed the mountain. He went alone. He went to pray.

Our lives are filled with material things. Political power, gadgets, social media and money rule the world. There are no meaningful relationships in our lives. We have many friends on Facebook rather than in real life. We do not wish a good morning to our neighbours but send hundreds of good morning messages by social media. We have come to believe that without God everything is possible in this world. Many have left the Church because they think there is no God in this world. We use rational thinking. We have scientific knowledge. We firmly believe that science has a solution for everything in this digital and technological world.

We are faced with Covid-19, the twenty-first century's biggest pandemic, which has turned the world upside down. People believed before the pandemic that, with our scientific knowledge, we could rule the world, that science and technology could solve and reduce

our suffering. Months have passed since the news of Covid-19 broke out. Scientists are trying their best to find a solution. But nothing has brought the pandemic to a halt. The pandemic is widespread even though there is a well administered health system in many countries.

The pandemic has troubled each one of us in one way or the other. It has brought a new social order. People were quarantined. People were isolated. We could not see our loved one on their final journey to heaven. It altered the lives of many in drastic ways. Further, the world will never become normal as it was in the past. The future is uncertain.

The disciples were the same. They thought that they could manage without Jesus. They thought that they could reach the other side. What happened?

They believed in material and human knowledge rather than the divine presence and love. They were anxious when troubles approached. They soon realised that they needed Jesus to help them.

Did the disciples recognise Jesus? No. They were not able to recognise Jesus in their brokenness.

We seek scientific knowledge and rational thinking to help us have peace in heart and mind. Meanwhile, we lose our souls to those material things and in human weaknesses.

We have a desire to be like Jesus, like Peter desired to walk like Jesus on the water. But we are frightened, as Peter was, when we feel the wind of troubles, difficulties, pains and sufferings. Peter did not focus on Jesus, the divine love and presence. Rather, he focused on the winds and the waves, and he was frightened. We, too, are the same as Peter. We focus on material things and science so much that our focus on Jesus is disturbed. It makes us feel that we are not cared for by Jesus.

Jesus had not abandoned the disciples, even though he was not present with them. He did not delay his approach to reach out to them when they faced trouble. He did so immediately.

We, too, think that Jesus has abandoned us and does not reach out to us immediately we face troubles and when we need him the most. But. today, Jesus promises us and assures us that he will come at once when we call out to him, when we approach him, when we surrender to him. Once Jesus comes to us, our troubles will die down.

This was the experience of the disciples and it can be our experience, too.

Are we ready to surrender to Jesus alone?

We will surely recognise Jesus and experience him when we go to the mountain in silence to understand his divine love and presence in our lives.

No Covid-19 can overpower us when Jesus our Saviour is with us.

May the heart of Jesus live in the hearts of all. Amen.


Miss Olive is Remembered

During this first term of the school year, the school welcomed back its faculty and new staff, a return to 'better normal' at CPHS with its students.

The students at Cayman Prep and High School demonstrated a positive attitude toward learning and enthusiastically returned to their studies, and regular actives over the course of the term ranging from a variety of academically focused programmes and extracurricular activities along with community initiatives.

Eight High School teachers successfully completed the COBIS (Council for British International Schools) Programme for Middle Leaders (CPML). This is an intensive programme of study and research, and was led by principal, Mr. Murphy, and vice principal, Mr. Coles.
