From the Pastor's Desk

Breathe in...breathe out....You do it 12-14 times a minute without thinking.

Breathing is a miracle we don't often stop to think about. We just do it. It keeps us alive. In the same amazing way, God has given us as Christians a way to "breathe spiritually" for our spiritual well-being.

Spiritual breathing, like physical breathing, is a process of exhaling the impure and inhaling the pure. It can become a way of life.

But the average Christian does not understand this concept and as a result lives on a spiritual roller coaster, trying to control his or her own life, which results in frustration. On our own, we may, at times, make a fresh start in life, only to lose it again – negative thoughts, angry words, slammed doors.

How can this change? It can do so by learning and applying the concept of spiritual breathing, which is like physical breathing in that:

- I. You "exhale" by confessing your sin as soon as you become aware of it, and claim God's forgiveness.
- 2. You "inhale" by asking the Holy Spirit to once again control and empower you to help you from returning to that sin.

Usually, we don't give much thought to our physical breathing. But spiritual breathing is something that requires conscious action – a readiness to "exhale", or confess our sin, and to "inhale", or trust God to fill us with his Holy Spirit.

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On Friday evening, 25th June, Elmslie and South Sound congregants were treated to a special night at Elmslie, celebrating the different nationalities and cultures represented in our churches. Congregants were

invited in advance to come dressed in their countries' colours and set up booths in the parking lot featuring cuisine from the various countries represented.

The evening started out in the sanctuary with a processional led by Conor Macmillan and Daniel Sanchez spotlighting the Sunday school children waving their countries' flags. Youth Minister, Mr. Roy, opened the service by



welcoming everyone, followed by **Zendaya Allen**, **Justice Ramoon**, **Gabby Webb** and **Zerah Allen** performing the Quadrille dance. **Colin Wilson** read an amusing story he had written, and musical items

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"...Let us join together in prayer"

Have you ever wondered why the disciples "all joined together constantly in prayer" following Jesus' ascension (Acts 1:14)? Why later did they seek to "give (their) attention to prayer" when early challenges faced the fledgling church (Acts 6:4)? And what was in the mind of those early Christians while Peter was in prison so that "many people had gathered and were praying" in the house of Mary the mother of John" (Acts 12:12)?

Those early Christians discovered that prayer was the lifeblood of the church. It was the source of their power. It provided the plans and strategy for the battle of life. It was that by which they received wisdom to make right decisions. It provided protection and deliverance from the powers of evil – and much more. So they gathered together to pray.

Christians cannot live the Christian life without prayer. Churches cannot survive unless they pray.

One of the most common things people tell you with regard to their prayer life is that praying is something they do on their own. Of course, a person's personal prayers are important. However, the implication is that there is no need to come *together* to pray. God hears and answers our individual prayers just the same as when we are praying with others, they say.

But it is a fallacy to think that coming together to pray is unnecessary. In the New Testament and throughout church history, Christians *met* to pray, and God moved in special ways when they came together for this purpose. In fact, the evidence is that those churches which do not engage in corporate prayer are those which are generally weak and ineffectual.

We haven't been very good at corporate prayer, on the whole. We need to reassess priorities determine whether the lack of spiritual power, than effective ministry and our often poor witness may be partly because of our reluctance to come together to intercede, to wrestle together with almighty God, for

the needs of our community and the wider world, as well as for the souls of people among whom we live.

The reasons many offer why they can't or won't attend a prayer meeting are usually only weak excuses. If you are serious about your faith, and you want your church to be vital and authentic, why not determine to join together with others on a regular basis to pray? Ask God about it, then make your decision!


Elmslie currently offers three alternative times during the week for corporate prayer: Tuesdays at 8pm, Wednesdays at noon and Saturdays at 7am.

EAT Update

Richard Trull, who heads up the Elmslie Emergency Assistance Team - or EAT - provides a brief update on this ministry by which

was **EAT** Why established? When Covid began to bite in Cayman in early 2020, Elmslie was blessed by a very generous, anonymous donation, specifically so Elmslie could provide medicine and other help as needed to those of our congregation, but also our wider community were financially who suffering from lost jobs.



How does EAT

work? The team meets regularly, plans, organizes, purchases, bags and distributes packaged foods and Foster's coupons. As many as 75 individuals and families in our community, receive EAT distributions every two weeks. Joan McField, with help from her sisters Carmen and Ellen, together with Anthony Bodden, Ann Marie Webb and several other Elmslie members, buy and bag food every other Saturday for EAT. Joan, assisted by Anthony and Carmen, delivers bags and coupons to those in need on our

EAT list. They not only deliver but also visit with recipients personally and offer to pray with them. They offer devotional literature, prepared by **Cathy Gomez**, to encourage people to learn more about the gospel.

Those who receive often express heartfelt thanks that, though the individual gifts are not large, this ministry has made a positive difference in their lives because it provides regular nourishment - sometimes it is the only food they get - and it also provides fellowship to combat loneliness. It is seen as an expression of Christ's love.

The team is grateful that others in the church have also contributed funds to this ministry and **Janet Macmillan** from the office keeps a complete accounting of every penny received and spent. Janet and **Harriet Vassell**, who leads our Pantry Ministry, regularly review to ensure that these ministries do not overlap.

How can we help EAT? One particular way is by helping for an hour or so with food bagging in the hall. You can pray for this ministry. You can also make a donation towards its ongoing ministry.

FBC Choir at Elmslie



Don't wait to exhale. Be quick to confess. We should pause and confess as soon as we entertain a sinful thought, speak an ugly word, or act on evil desires. "Spiritual exhaling" is agreeing with God about our sin, whether in thought or deed, thanking Him for his forgiveness, and expressing a willingness to change our attitudes and actions. The practice of breathing spiritually aids in developing a God-consciousness which, in turn, serves to keep the revived heart spiritually focused and less susceptible to continual sinning.

To inhale spiritually is to claim and receive the fullness of the Holy Spirit by faith. How do you do that? When you first received Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit immediately entered your life, and he never leaves – John 1:12, Colossians 2:9-10 and John 14:16-17 tell us that. Though all born-again Christians are indwelt by the Holy Spirit, not all are continuously filled with the Holy Spirit. When the negative circumstances of life crowd in and we take control of the reins of our life, we push back or crowd out the Holy Spirit when, really, we should, "keep on being filled with the Holy Spirit" (Ephesians 5:18).

It is a continuous, conscious choice we make to walk in the Holy Spirit's power. Repentance is not a one-time thing; it's giving our lives over to God and asking Him to direct our decisions on a moment-by-moment basis. Though spiritual breathing is a conscious thing, the more we choose to do it, the more it becomes second nature.


Presbyterian Church Anniversary Celebrations to Commence
