A Reflection: Seeking God's Face

What is it that God wants more than anything else in our relationship with him? It is to know him better. How do we go about doing this?

David answers this in Psalm 27:8 when he says to God, "Your face will I seek."

What does it mean to seek God's face if he is already there – if he is everywhere? **Tim Keller** in his book entitled Prayer helpfully suggests that when we speak to someone, we don't look over their shoulder or at their feet but we address their face. He describes it as the "relational gate" into a person's mind and heart. So to seek God's face is to intentionally sense his reality and presence with the help of the Holy Spirit. It is to deliberately seek to commune and interact with him, sharing his thoughts and love.

We must therefore be serious and focused in our prayers. John 1:18 tells us, "No one has ever seen God, but the one and only Son, who is himself God and is in the closest relationship with the Father, has made him known." So we look at and think about Jesus in order to know God. Keller says, "Jesus' person and work is the breakthrough for any who want to draw near and seek God's face." Jesus is the "Word made flesh," and we discover God best when we spend time seeking him in his written Word, the Bible.

Profile on Jennelle McLaughlin

A familiar figure in the south wing of the church during worship, and one very involved with almost all activities to do with our young people, is a young lady named **Jennelle McLaughlin** known to many as 'Nellie.' The Family News caught up with her to hear something of her story.

"I am one of ten children, having nine biological siblings - four sisters and five brothers. When I was three months old, I was adopted by **Madda Whittaker** so I have grown up in a Christian home.

Jennelle was born and raised here in Cayman and her entire schooling was at the Cayman Prep

and High School, right up to "A" levels. After that, she went to the University of Bedfordshire in the United Kingdom where she studied Accounting and Finance and earned a Bachelor's Degree. "On my return, I went to work at Scotiabank where I am a Senior Processing Officer," she says.

When asked as to how she got so involved in the life and work of the church, and especially with youth ministry, she replied, "I was basically born in the church. I was involved in all youth ministries growing up - Sunday school, Girls' Brigade, Youth Group and the Dance Ministry. Growing up in church was fun. I got to meet and interact with many people and created friendships with individuals who were not a part of my school."


It was an earlier youth minister who had a particular impact on her life during her teens. "Through Sunday school and Bible study

with **Mr. Ray McLeod** I became a Christian at the age of 16 and was baptized soon after. It was important to me because I knew from where God had brought me. He has kept me all these years and he has never failed me yet," she adds. "All those youth activities I was a part of as a child helped nurture me into the young lady I am today. They gave me a strong foundation in Christ. I am still a part of those same ministries, although now as a leader, because of the impact the leaders made on my life. Nyoman writes from Bali: "Last week Saturday we were travelling to Singaraja on a visit when we had a small accident, and the back glass of my car was broken. But, thanks to God, we were all safe and were

able to continue home. Praise God! The family whom we visited accepted Christ!"

He continued, "I learned some lessons from this – the ministry is something that requires us to have courage and to sacrifice. The cost is expensive, but



Christ has set an example." Replacing the back window, he indicates, will $\cot US$ 400 – a large sum in that country. Nyoman went on to say, "As soldiers of Christ, we must focus on soul winning. Our needs are sure to be met by the faithful Great Shepherd, and we must believe he is ready to provided through the 'Central Bank of Allah.'" (Allah is the name for God, even among Christians, in that part of the world.)

"When I had the accident, I was in shock but after a few seconds the Holy Spirit reminded me that I have to rejoice – because of the harvest. The problem is small compared to the result of the work of that day."

He baptised two ladies, converted from a Hindu background, the following week. Their names are **Williani and Yuli Oktavani** (see picture).
