Do you play the blame game?

Society is very good at playing the blame game. Whenever something unfortunate or painful occurs, somebody has to be held responsible. There are no longer any "accidents" in life; someone is to blame.

We are pretty good at it ourselves. When some misfortune happens which causes us discomfort, loss or hurt, we look around for someone to blame, someone to take the responsibility. "It's not my fault," we declare. We hold out that it cannot have happened because of some mistake we have made or some

wrong we have done, or that it was merely an accident for which no one was to blame. We find it difficult to admit that we may have been at fault, let alone that it was just an unfortunate happening. For example, we feel this way when we catch our toe on a paver and break our leg: the owner of the driveway is at fault, or when there is an occurrence which is often referred to as "an act of God": the Cat. Five hurricane which blew our roof off was because the builder did not provide enough hurricane straps.

This inclination to find someone to blame may be why we find it so difficult to apologize when we are wrong – when something **is** our fault. We are usually too proud to admit it so we play the blame game – we look for someone else to take responsibility.

The Bible is clear that we need to face up to our moral weaknesses and sins. Society prefers to use words like "mistakes" or "sickness" for things which are just plain wrong. When this happens, we tend to cover up sin, we fail



to take responsibility or, worse, we look for someone else to take the blame for what is **our** wrongdoing. However, if we are to know forgiveness from God, we have to be honest and admit when we do or say something wrong. No excuses. No rationalizing. No coverup. We can't hide it from God, anyway, so why do we try?

The same applies when we wrong someone else. The only chance of forgiveness and restoration will come when we are honest and take the blame when it is our fault.

Most of us want restoration. Bob Gass, a devotional writer, has pointed out that "forgiveness and restoration are first cousins, but with a difference: forgiveness can happen in an instant, restoration often requires time." He points out that the word restoration in the original Greek gives two pictures. First, fishermen mending their nets and, second, a doctor resetting a dislocated bone. He goes on to state: "The good news is that our God is in the business of resetting and restoring." Mending nets and the healing of bones take time, and we may need patience in allowing God to do his work of restoration in our lives – a work that will make us better rather than bitter - which is often the result of trying to blame someone else.

The Apostle John has expressed it best in those well-known words in 1 John 1:8-9, "If we claim we have no sin, we are only fooling ourselves and not living in the truth. But if we confess our sins to him, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all wickedness" (NLT). With God, when we truly repent of our sin, there is both forgiveness and restoration.


Born and raised in Trinidad, she eventually left for Bermuda in 2007 before arriving in Cayman in 2010 when she was offered a job

However, although a few offers to work elsewhere were available, I found myself moving back to Cayman in late 2014.

"I grew up in a Christian home with my parents and two older siblings so was exposed to the Christian faith from birth. Although I grew up in a Christian home with a predominantly Presbyterian background, I was also exposed to other faiths. Trinidad being a multi-religious society, I attended two Hindu primary schools and an Anglican secondary school. I had many childhood friends of different faiths and some with none! Childhood playdates and birthday parties sometimes took on a religious flair and this followed into adulthood at weddings when I've been in the bridal party for both Hindu and Muslim ones. I've also been blessed to travel around the world where I have observed and learnt about other cultures and religions. My exposure to different religions has helped to confirm my decision to follow the Christian faith.


"Although I grew up in church I never attended Sunday school. At that time, our family was one of the few with young children so I sat in church with all the adults, as there were not enough students to form a class. I never learnt any Sunday school songs or memory verses when I was young! As a teenager I was involved in youth group and choir. Later, when I became a young adult, I became the treasurer of the church for a few years before I left for

Bermuda. Officially I'm SSU's mission coordinator and a worship leader, but also assist or volunteer in other areas when able."



She believes the church could have a bigger impact on Cayman by changing its image – not its doctrine, she hastens to add – as it is seen as an archaic institution rather than as a body of like-minded individuals who have a passion to love and serve the community. She added, "We were commanded to love our neighbour yet so many see us only as judging our neighbour."

I spent the next two years living and finishing high school in Montezuma, New Mexico, surrounded by classmates from over 90 different countries, a number of whom I have already been able to visit in their homes! I made sure to make the most of my year connecting with my Hungarian family and exploring the stunning country that Hungary is!

Throughout my time spent abroad, I have always remained grateful for the firm foundation instilled in me by my family and my faith, and I couldn't have reached where I am without my many support systems - my close and extended family, friends and church family - that keep me grounded, motivated and are always there when I need them. I always look forward to reconnecting with everyone whenever I am back on island for a break. In the future, I hope to continue to spend time

abroad - ideally in a position that allows me to promote the Cayman Islands, as well as to eventually return to contribute and apply my global experience and international knowledge to the domestic scene.




encourage all young people in Cayman to never diminish their potential but instead seek out opportunities to pursue a life that excites and fulfills them - as many of those opportunities exist!
