Janilee Clifford

We extend our condolences to the family of **Mrs. Janilee Clifford** who passed away on October 6th, a few months after passing her 90th birthday.

Miss Janilee, as many knew her, lived a full and active life. Having grown up on Crewe Road, she was a life-long member of the Robert Young Memorial Church and served as an elder for many years,

as well as being involved in many ministries in the church. She was also very active in the community, serving as a Pink Lady and with the Red Cross, to mention two areas of many.

Many knew her, however, for her long service as a teacher at the Cayman Prep School (now the Cayman Prep and High). She started there in 1965, helping out in the absence of the kindergarten teacher, and continued until her retirement in 1996 when she was head of the school's Junior Department. She was highly regarded by students and teachers alike, especially for being the "in-house Caymanian" - knowledgeable and proud of her heritage and able to impart it in such a memorable and personal way that the stories lived on in the minds of her students.



Janilee will be greatly missed, no less than by her five children, **Cathy** and **Carol**, both members at Elmslie, **Janet**, **Susan** and **Chuckie**, and the extended family.

To Be or Not To Be?

Hamlet's question in Shakespeare's play is one, perhaps, we need to ask ourselves as Christians. It may be, however, that the better question is, "Which should take priority - who we *are* or what we *do*? Being or doing?"

The Apostle James is often quoted by those who would answer the second. "Faith without works is dead," he stated. They point to those who make claims to being a Christian but show no Christian action.

But, of course, James is simply stressing that if we claim to believe, it will be seen as invalid unless there is evidence of that belief in a person's life and behaviour. He is in no way denying the Apostle's Paul's statement that "it is by grace you have been saved, through faith,... not by works" (Ephesians 2:8-9). His emphasis is different. He is simply stating that what we say we believe will be seen in service.

The truth is that we behave in a certain way because of how we view life. There is saying: "Whatever a man thinks, so he is." Our view of the world will translate into a lifestyle. Our minds govern how we behave, what we do and how we relate. *Continued on Page 3*

Profile of Marcos Tinoco

Some may have wondered as to who the imposing looking guy playing the bass guitar during morning worship is. So, *Family News* decided to catch up with him to find out a little about him.

Marcos first arrived on the island over 18 years ago – just before Hurricane Ivan – but left after four years before returning in 2010, and has been living and working here since.

"I was born and grew up in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in a family of



five bothers and two sisters," he says. "My mother converted from Catholicism to becoming a Baptist few months а before I was born so I came into the world to a brand Protestant new family. All my family committed are Christians."

Marcos said he himself became a Christian and was baptised in his Baptist church in Rio at the age of 11. "I attended public

schools all my life where I learned a lot of lessons about life. I was fortunate to graduate in Physical Education from the Rio de Janeiro Federal University, continuing to my Masters Degree in Football Specialisation at the same university in the early 90s."

While at college, he worked for a bank but on graduation, he became a fitness coach for several football clubs in Brazil. He then spent a year in Qatar, followed by two in Saudi Arabia, coaching some Brazilian clubs in between, before coming to Cayman as Senior Men's National Football Coach in 2003.

In 2007, he left Cayman, accepting the job as coach of the Tanzania National Team. After two years, he took a job with a pro-league team in Trinidad and Tobago before moving back to *Continued on Page 4*

Nyoman Sumaryana

Nyoman is the pastor of the Love and Grace Church in Tabanan, Bali, Indonesia. He is one of the missionaries we support. He writes in a recent church update:

"Because of God's love for us, we keep on penetrating into the Hindu and Muslim community through education. One of the ways to do outreach is by teaching the pre-school

children basic English lessons - writing and reading - free of charge. At the end of the class we always give them a small gift to improve their nutrition. Classes are held twice a week.

"God has opened the door very wide for us to preach the Good News to these children and so as



early as possible they hear about the redemption of Jesus Christ our Lord.That is our goal and the rest we lift up to the work of the Holy Spirit to convince them.

"The advantage of this method is that we can more easily make contact with the parents of the kids which enables us to build a close relation with them."

He then lists some of the strategies they employ when a person becomes a believer in Christ, especially young people, usually from a Hindu or Muslim background:

• The Bible tells us to put God first before everything. Attending Sunday service and a cell group meeting is the application of living faith.

• Discipleship must characterize the life of the healthy church so we equip the teenager to be ready to be a witness in their community – to their own family, at school and in the community.

• Baptism is the first step to lead people to have a victorious life as believer as they are born again to new life with Christ.

He ends, "We thank you for your partnership in ministry since the beginning until today.We really appreciate your prayer and support as you know this fruitful ministry is the result of your consistent prayer and support. We encourage you to take part in this kingdom project for God, and we pray He will continue to grant us time that we will use wisely for His glory."

What is it that makes a Christian attractive? What is it at the end of the day that will make them best remembered? It is their character. Who they are. That they are authentic with regard to their faith. They display something of the character of Christ.

As Christians, therefore, it is essential that we focus first and foremost on who we are - our character. We need to cultivate our relationship with the Lord, get to know him better and allow his Spirit to make us more like Christ. It is not that we should be like some of the lazy Christians in Thessalonica who, thinking that Jesus was returning any day, sat around doing nothing - something Paul chided them for. The point is, unless we are in a right relationship with God, are growing in spiritual maturity and experiencing the fulness of his Spirit, all our "works", as good as they might be, will be of little ultimate use or bring honour to God. This is because all we do as Christians can only be effective when we recognize that God is working in and through us. "Apart from me" said Jesus, "you can do nothing" (John 15:5) - nothing of ultimate value. Learning this truth requires us to actively and seriously focus on cultivating our relationship with him.

We live in a world which likes to recognize people for what they have done. They are given plaques or honours. A few weeks ago, one of our own, **Janilee Clifford**, passed away. Her passing made me think of two other ladies who recently died – **Elizabeth Hurlston** and **Olive Miller**. All three were true icons for their outstanding service to society. All had received


awards from the Government. Yet, they had something else in common. Each loved their Lord. Their faith and relationship with him was the most important thing to them. Their willingness to be involved and serve their church as well as the wider society was an expression of this. Their faith was seen as authentic, expressed in "good works".

More than anything else we need to focus on deepening our relationship with God.We need to spend more time with him, with his Word, in prayer. This should be the focus, too, of our Bible studies and preaching. The thing that may surprise us is that those who do this will be those who become more and more active in Christian service, reaching out in witness and meeting people's needs. Their faith is not "dead"!

Paul expresses something supremely important in the last verse of 2 Corinthians 3 with regard to Christians who understand this: "We all... are being transformed into (Christ's) image with ever increasing glory, which comes from the Lord, who is the Spirit." May we be those whose desire more than anything else is to display the image of Christ in our lives and our deeds.


