Editorial: The Servant Queen and the King She Served

During these last weeks, hundreds of thousands of words have been spoken about the late Queen. Hundreds of pictures of her life have been seen on TV. What else is there to say - except to note that she displayed a remarkable greatness.

The word great is used to describe many but few would argue that Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, was a truly great lady, and not simply for the length of her reign.

The Bible talks of greatness. Jesus once told his disciples, "Whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant."

This was the kind of greatness the Queen displayed. The constant theme in the many commentaries on her life has been that she was a woman who led by serving, one who was devoted to duty, but who did so in a humble and gracious way.

But there was more to it than this. A royal biographer wrote, "Two things stand out – the Queen's constant sense of duty and her devotion to God. Of this she speaks humbly but openly, especially in her Christmas broadcasts." Her simple trust in God and her devotional life were intrinsic to her life. Her sense of calling to serve her people she saw as one from God. Every Sunday she



was able, she attended church. Significantly, among her ten favourite songs, two were hymns: *Praise, my* soul, the King of Heaven and The Lord's my Shepherd.

On the occasion of her 90th birthday, a book was published, authored by two Christian writers, **Mark Greene** and **Catherine Butcher**, entitled "*The Servant Queen and the King She Serves.*" It illustrates the faith of the Queen and how it characterized her life. The book quotes part of the Queen's 2002 Christmas broadcast: "I know just how much I rely on my faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning. I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God... I draw strength from the message of hope in the Christian gospel."

This extraordinary woman displayed her trust in God, something which enabled her to be such a remarkable and greatly respected monarch.

A story appeared in the lead up to her funeral which reinforces an understanding of the depth of her relationship with God. One of her chaplains had been preaching on the Second Coming of our Lord, and afterwards, in conversation with him, the Queen exclaimed, "Oh, how I wish the Lord would come in my lifetime!" "Why?" asked the chaplain, "does your Majesty feel this very earnest desire?" The Queen replied with quivering lips, and her whole countenance lighted up by deep emotion, "I would so love to lay my crown at his feet."

We would all do well to note the deep faith of someone such as she and seek to emulate it. As she, though a monarch, sought to follow Jesus Christ and to live like him, so every one of us as 'ordinary' people would do well to ensure that, like her, we have a personal relationship with him, and seek to live our lives in service to him and other people to his glory.

Hundreds of congregants (old and new) gathered in the historic sanctuary of Elmslie Church for Reunion Sunday on 11th September. This event was held as part of our 100th Anniversary Celebrations. 








Adult Bible Class to Begin Again

How important is it to know and understand our faith? The answer is probably obvious. Very! How do we get to do so? Again, it is clear that we have been provided the means – the Bible. How can the Bible help us? We must read and study it, and we need to listen to those who can help us to better know and understand it. Ignorance in this case



is not bliss! An early saint named Jerome once stated, "Ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ."

The Apostle Paul told his young friend Timothy that "all Scripture is inspired by God and is useful to teach us what is true and to make us realize what is wrong in our lives. It corrects us

when we are wrong and teaches us to do what is right. God uses it to prepare and equip his people to do every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17 NLT).

To grow in our faith and to better live out our faith, we need to know our Bibles. Several years ago, an adult Bible class was held before the morning service, and it is to be restarted so as to provide another opportunity to learn more about Scripture. It will start at 9.30 am and will last about 45 minutes. It will be held in the church hall.

Condolences to Sam Rice

We received word early September that Sam's mother, **Elizabeth Rice**, has passed away. She was six months short of her 100th birthday and died at her home in Pittsburg.

It was his mother who first went to Haiti as a missionary, serving there from 1979 - 1984, during the Duvalier days, and Sam, who had qualified as a Registered Nurse, went to join her. She returned to the USA while Sam remained, joined Ministries in Action and established a clinic in Dariol on the south coast. He helped establish Christian schools and churches in the area, as well as building a Christian radio station. It was here that several of the early mission teams from Elmslie first met him. Up to today, many here in Cayman continue to support school children through Sam's sponsorship initiative.

He retired several years ago in order to return home to care for his mother, and at the end of her life was her primary caregiver.
