How About Sunday Morning Worship? (Part 3)

I stressed in the previous articles that we must be serious and thoughtful about our worship. This will impact our preparation, and it will characterize the time itself. But worship should also be joyful and 'life-giving' (though I am not fully sure of the meaning of this expression I often hear!).

Another important characteristic of worship is reverence. This is being aware of the nature of the God whom we have come to worship and, equally, recognizing ourselves in the light of this. We need to start with a sense of the holiness of God and our sinfulness before we dwell on his grace and love. We like to sing, "Come, just as you are, to worship..." but, in point of fact, we can't come "just as we are"! Like Isaiah, following his vision of the Lord, we should cry out, "Woe to me!... I am ruined! For I am a man of unclean lips and I live among a people of unclean lips..." (Isaiah 6:5). So, most worship leaders will have a time early in the service where acknowledgement and confession of sin is made, seeking God's forgiveness. We do this because we cannot have fellowship with a righteous God with unconfessed sin. The Psalmist stated, "If I had cherished sin in my heart, the Lord would not have listened" (Psalm 66:18). The fact is that God has invited us to approach him, but only through Christ. It is because of his work on the cross we have been forgiven and thus can enter his presence. As 'saints who sometimes sin' we must come to receive again forgiveness and cleansing, not now for salvation but for fellowship. Remember, it was to Christians that John wrote that "if we confess our sins, God... will forgive... and cleanse..." (1 John 1:8-9).

Every part of a service should be worship. That is why we should never seek to 'entertain' (not even as children) as entertainment draws attention to the person and the performance whereas worship should *always* point to God and seek his bonour

Even the offering should be seen as an act of worship and therefore should be done prayerfully and thoughtfully. To see the bag coming round and dig into

our pockets or purses for a couple of dollars is hardly a way of expressing our love and gratitude to the God who has saved us!

In most Reformed traditions ours. sermon is the peak of worship. Everything else leads to this. The music, prayers and scriptures should all be preparation for worship in



preaching – the 'proclamation of the Word.' This is the time when we should listen for God to speak to us. He does this through God's servant, using God's Word to address God's people with the authority and power of God's Spirit.

Eric is a born and bred Caymanian. "I wouldn't have it any other way," he insists. He grew up going to

Elmslie Church with his mother. "Even when I didn't want to go, I didn't have a choice, living under my parents' roof!" he states.

His early days were typical of many Caymanians. Although he kept to himself a lot, he had a small circle of friends, got involved



with a few groups and loved the night life - sessions, movies, functions and so on. "I still do, to a degree," he adds.

God used two events to grab his attention. "I got hit hard emotionally and psychologically when a friend of mine was murdered and that's when a transformation started taking place with my journey towards God," he says. Not too long after that, my best friend died of kidney complications. It was a major blow in my young life." That transformation reached its climax the night he attended an outreach event at Elmslie and gave his life to Christ, just before he left Cayman for University. "It was a great time in my life. God surrounded me with a bunch of people in university who were instrumental in helping to keep

me grounded in the faith and to grow as a disciple."

Eric is married to Elitia and they recently celebrated their 10th anniversary. She is a teacher at the Clifton Hunter High School and God has given them two little boys, **Eze** (7) and **Emry** (6) who attend Cayman Prep. "They are doing very well and we're proud of them." When asked about his own work, he replied, "I work in the IT industry for the Cayman Islands

Government. I am an IT professional amongst a team of application developers - and no, I don't fix computers!"

Sermons must therefore be scriptural (and the congregation needs to have their Bibles open). A good sermon will provide both teaching and preaching; providing understanding of Scripture *and* its application. It will tell the congregation what they should do but, equally important, how they can do it.

A good sermon will elicit a response which may, or may not, be in the form of an 'altar call'. There needs to be an opportunity for responding, whether with a time of quiet or a hymn. Some churches have dispensed with a final hymn so as to allow for personal reflection so there is actually quiet at the end of the service. One important thing to keep in mind when it comes to hymns of response is to sing them only if you mean them. I wonder how many honest people there are during the singing of All to Jesus, I surrender or Take my silver and my gold, not a mite would I withhold"!

It is my prayer that some of the things said have helped you to think more carefully about whether you are among "the kind of worshipers the Father seeks" (John 4:23).
