A New Government

We have a new government! Whether the outcome of the elections and choice of cabinet pleased or disappointed us, whatever our hopes or fears for the future of our islands, now is a good time to reflect on our duty as Christians towards "the governing authorities" (Romans 13:1).

Much could be said but let me briefly suggest three biblical principles with regard to government. First, having a government to run and order society is God's idea. Proverbs 8:15-16 tells us - God speaking, "By me kings reign and rulers issue decrees that are just; by me princes govern, and nobles – all who rule on earth," and Paul states in Romans 13: I that "the authorities that exist have been established by God." It is not only 'good' governance let alone a democratic form which he had in mind. The authorities of Paul's day were both tyrannical and undemocratic! All those who govern are answerable to God and it is he who has ultimate authority. Pilate was reminded of this by Jesus' response in John 19:10-11. "Pilate said. 'Don't you realise I have power either to free you or to crucify you?"

"Jesus answered, 'You would have no power over me if it were not given to you from above." Government has divine authority because God established it, and God is supremely sovereign.

Second, we are to "submit to the governing authorities." (Romans 13:1). Peter says similarly, "Submit yourselves for the Lord's sake to every human authority" (I Peter 2:13). Notice the words "for the Lord's sake." He is speaking to Christian believers. If government is God's means of ordering society, then we as Christians are responsible to support and obey it. Christians must be model citizens.

This does not mean we may not disagree with policy or decisions, or even like the persons who make up government. It may be necessary to challenge and even protest from time to time. There are sometimes matters when 'Caesar' clashes with our Christian convictions in the legislative or public arena and we may need to speak out or even take action.

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Youth Service at South Sound United

Youth Sunday was held on 7th March. It had been exactly one year since the last planned youth service had to be cancelled due to a government mandate to close churches as part of Cayman's response to the developing global health crisis.

Fittingly, the children had selected a theme reflecting the worry and anxiety experienced over the last year as the COVID pandemic

affected life for us here in Cayman as well as our friends and family around the world. Led by **Megan** and **Gail**, the theme of "Do Not Fear, for I Am with You" was explored through music, scripture, prayer and drama.

Azharia, **Caleigh** and **Victoria** told the story of **Joseph Scriven**. Joseph penned the well know hymn, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" originally as a poem to comfort his ill mother. It reflects the solace and support he personally found in Jesus when he experienced great tragedy in his life. He found that

Volcanic Eruption in St. Vincent and the Grenadines

Following the eruption of the La Soufriere Volcano on the island of St. Vincent in mid-April, various appeals for help have gone out. Special offerings were collected on the last two Sundays of April at all United Churches, with the funds and buying of goods being organized by **Ormond Williams**, himself a Vincentian, through the Regional Council office.

Many have also heard from Walford Thompson, whom Elmslie has supported for many years, of the great needs of his island. He writes, "We at the Arnos Vale Covenant Assembly Church have put together a relief and recovery committee, and have selected five evacuation centers where we will focus our relief effort initially. Yesterday, we purchased rice, flour, sugar, peas, bread, chicken and water, and distributed to several shelters that were in urgent need of food. Two of our pastors also conducted devotions at the centres they visited, which was greatly appreciated." He indicates that many, too, are in private shelters, mainly overcrowded homes of poor people who have taken others in, and with few resources, where the situation is equally desperate and they are reaching out to these, too.

He indicates the situation is not likely to end anytime soon. Apart from helping to meet the practical and immediate needs, he has put together a team of trained counsellors, and is also providing spiritual help to the many who have lost everything.

Walford is looking to those in the Caribbean islands whom he has been able to help over many years, both in relief work and through programmes of evangelism and church growth through Ministries in Action, for immediate assistance in this very challenging time.

For those who wish to send funds directly, the preferred way is to send them to the church treasurer, **Bertram Mapp**, through MoneyGram. His address is Warner Hill, Arnos Vale, SVG, and his telephone 784-458-4752. A special relief account has been set up. The amount and transaction number should be sent to Walford's email: Walford.thompson@gmail.com or he can be phoned at 784-456-9829 or 305-851-8221. All funds will be used for relief work.

"Since Hurricane Gilbert in 1988," he writes, "the Lord has privileged me to work in relief and recovery efforts following natural disasters in the U.S., across the Caribbean and in Latin America. Now, I work on my home island to bring relief in the name of Christ, for the praise of our glorious Lord. Thank you for your concern, love and interest."

George Town Charge Synod Recognitions


During the recent Synod, several members or past members of our charge were given special recognition. We offer our congratulations.

But Peter gives those of us who are Christians clear guidance as to how we address the matters with which we may disagree. Do so, he says, "with gentleness and respect, keeping a clear conscience" (I Peter 3:15-16). Our attitude and the way we address issues must be Christ-like.

Third, we are to pray for government. I Timothy 2:1-2 tells us "... that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people – for kings and all those in authority." This is not an optional extra for our prayers, and nor can we be selective, in this context, as for whom we pray. He states, "... all those in authority."

One of the important reasons for praying for our government leaders is that many of them will not be praying for themselves as they may not be believers. So we must stand in the gap and ask God for what they may not themselves be asking for their enormously responsible, difficult and consequential task.

What specifically might we pray for them? Most importantly, for God's wisdom. This is not just ability and knowledge, though those, too, are important. It is the ability to legislate good laws and make right decisions, both morally and practically. We need to ask God to also give them integrity, a willingness to work hard and, last but not least, a spirit of humility.

A comment was made following the installation of the new premier: "He (and by implication government) has restored my faith in Cayman." Let us as Christians be reminded, however, that at the end of the day, "some trust in chariots and some in horses, but we trust in the name of the LORD our God" (Psalm 20:7). It is God, not government, on whom we must ultimately depend.
