New Elder, Lorna Reid

During Elmslie's congregational meeting in mid-February, long-time member, Lorna Reid, was elected to the Congregational Board of Elders. Lorna had, in fact, served on a previous occasion several years ago.

Lorna was brought up in a single parent home in Jamaica, alongside two brothers and a sister. "My early Christian connection was Anglican," she says, "but as there was no youth fellowship in the church my family and I attended, I asked my mother if I, along with a friend, could attend one at Webster Memorial United Church. Since that time, I have been attached to the United Church."

She moved to the Cayman Islands in August 1981 to take up a post in the Cayman Islands Middle School as an art teacher. On arriving, she was asked to join the Special Education Department as she had worked with a remedial adult education program in Jamaica for four years. She served in that department for six years, then moved to the Art Department. "I am a teacher of Visual and Performing Arts, having a Diploma in Fine Arts, a Certificate in Art Education, Dance Education and in Special Education. I also gained a Master's in Education Management and another as an Education Specialist.



"Having become a Christian at the age of 12, and although I have

had many challenges, I am thankful that I have had strong support every step of my journey. I was an active Girls' Brigade leader, a youth leader and, later, a young adults' leader. I have sung in the choir and became a youth advocate in Jamaica. This I know was my first giant step to service in God's kingdom. The transition to Cayman was made possible due to the work I undertook in the youth arm of the church."

Lorna variously worshiped in Elmslie, Savannah United and Webster Memorial in her early years here. However, she eventually decided to become a member at Elmslie.

"I was baptised with most of the Koinonia group at the Prospect Youth Centre during David Larson's time as youth leader in the mid/late eighties. That was a period of recommitment and reawakening for me. I have continued to grow stronger in my faith and service as I have sought God's dictates and direction for my life.

"Education, sports, dance and art are strong areas of service for me. I see these as my mission Continued on Page 3

Charges Delinked and Linked



nineties. I founded the Cayman Islands National Dance Company in 1988 and have been the choreographer for opening ceremonies for international netball, football and the Carifta Games. I have been involved with many Carifesta festivals as well as at the World Arts Council. I believe God called me to these, and I have sought to bring him glory in them. I am also a member of the Board of Directors of the Cayman National Cultural Foundation and served on the National Gallery Board back in the early 2000s.

"The adoption of my youngest nephew **Rajay** and guardianship of my youngest niece **Shamara**, both belonging to my younger brother, gave me two children to call my own. But I have enjoyed the experience of mothering and serving as aunt to many more in the school and church communities."

She says that her present vision is to help bridge the gap between the varied groups of adults in our church community. She has watched these groups lose their grip on what they saw as their place in the church and reflected that that the end result has been a church which she believes is floundering. "I am not sure how I can help, but I know I am being called to try.

"I have been running a mile a minute doing what I see as God's work, but I am fearful that He may not be as involved in what I am or was doing as He wants me to be. Being an elder will allow me a seat at the table where decisions to enhance the work and mobilization of the church are made. It is my hope that I will be an effective and efficient part of what God wants to do in and through Elmslie.

"I sometimes wonder whether the church universal, and Elmslie in particular, are losing their impact and effectiveness on the individual lives of our community. I worry that, if we do not work now at restoring trust and faith in God, we will lose a generation - or more. It is therefore very important that the work of the church is relevant to the needs of the community."

Let us keep Lorna in our prayers as she undertakes this important responsibility in the church.

At the same congregational meeting at which Lorna was elected an elder, Colin Wilson was also elected. However, Colin has since resigned.


Special Anniversary

Pantry Ministry

Harriet Vassell took over responsibility for the Pantry Ministry early last year. She says,

"Each week, there were about 40-45 people in attendance last year, with different speakers coming for the praise and worship time. In June we had a birthday party sponsored by **Elitia Vassell** which was enjoyed and appreciated by all. On 21st and 28th July, we were visited by the Children and Teen Camp students who entertained us and helped serve the soup."

In August, the ministry took a summer break but were then interrupted by the outbreak of Covid in September. "So we decided to distribute bags and soup every two weeks outside the church hall," she continued. "South Sound United sponsored a Christmas bag which contained some practical gifts as well as a copy of Our Daily Bread which we handed out on Wednesday, 1st December, just before the Christmas break."

Since March this year, they have been meeting in the hall every two weeks, just for an hour, with the attendance rising to 60-65. "We have a speaker each time and we distribute a bowl of soup and a bag of nonperishables which they take with them." Harriet adds, "The purpose of the Pantry Ministry is to give assistance to the less fortunate. I spoke at the South Sound United Church back in June, thanking those there who had contributed. I also want to express my appreciation to our helpers **Francilla, Shovourne, Ann Marie, Mr. Martin**, the custodian, and **Roy** for their continuous help each week."

Special Visitors

Visitors from the UK with a special connection to Cayman spent two weeks on the island in early April, and visited Elmslie for the Good Friday service.

During the first half of the 1970s, **Sheila Lockwood** came to work at the Cayman Islands High School as a maths teacher. However, she came as a Girls' Brigade officer and **Mrs. Olive Miller** soon had her involved, especially with the West Bay Company. She was also responsible for starting the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme here. However, it was in Elmslie church that she was introduced to a young man, **Robert Ridgway**, working here for a year as a Cadastral Survey officer.

She left Cayman in 1975, married Robert and lived in numerous countries because of his job, and they had two daughters, **Margaret** and **Anne**.

Sadly, Sheila contracted Parkinson's Disease some twenty years ago and died in May 2018. She requested that her ashes be interred in Cayman, and after two attempts to come to Cayman, both times thwarted by COVID, the family finally arrived, and a special service was held in the West Bay Cemetery.


